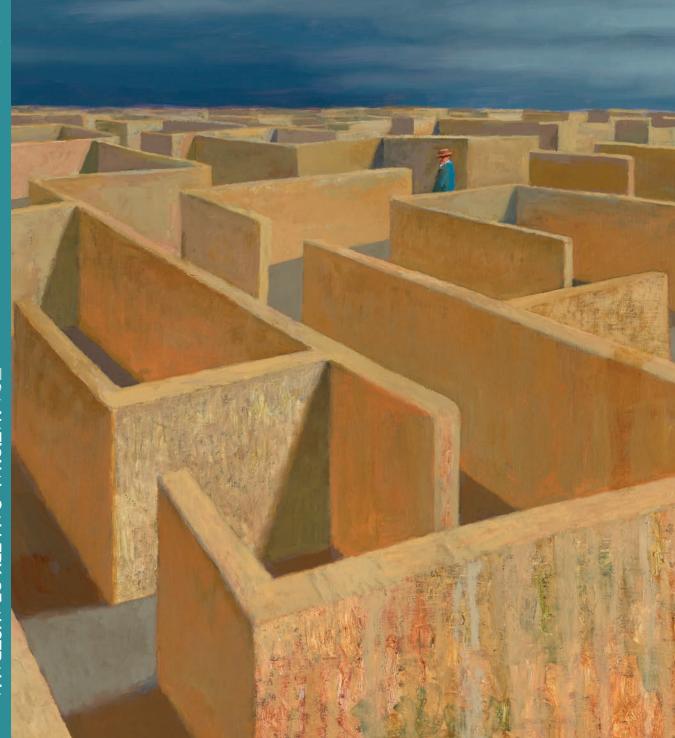

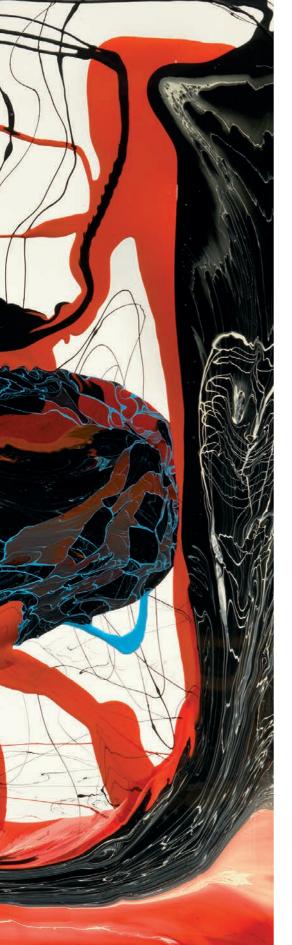

# **Objectives**

The National Gallery of Australia Foundation, a company limited by guarantee under the Corporations Law, is a non-profit organisation established to support the National Gallery of Australia.

The principal objectives of the Foundation are to:

- maintain, improve and develop the national collection of works of art owned by the National Gallery of Australia
- promote, maintain, improve and develop the National Gallery of Australia
- support the development and conduct by the National Gallery of Australia of travelling exhibitions of works of art
- raise money to achieve these objectives.



# Chairman's report

In the Foundation's twenty-fifth anniversary year, I am pleased to present the National Gallery of Australia Foundation Annual Report 2013-14, a record of the many activities and achievements of the Foundation. These achievements would not have been possible without the generous support of donors, at all levels, to the various programs of the Foundation.

The Foundation has once again achieved outstanding results with the generous and enthusiastic support of donors as well as the loyal contribution of long-term supporters. Cash donations amounted to \$4.594 million and, with the support of the Foundation, the National Gallery of Australia also received gifts of works of art valued at \$8.515 million and corporate sponsorship of \$3.578 million. These figures are reflected in the National Gallery of Australia Annual Report 2013-14.

#### Major donations and gifts

Tom Roberts's delightful portrait Miss Minna Simpson 1886 was acquired as a gift from the Council and Foundation Board of the National Gallery of Australia to commemorate the tenure of Director Ron Radford AM from 2004 to 2014. Another generous gift in honour of the Director, Labyrinth 2011, the last painting by Jeffrey Smart AO, was acquired with the assistance of the Margaret Olley Art Trust and Philip Bacon AM.

The acquisition of a pair of rare and extraordinary Ethel Spowers oil paintings was generously funded by David Thomas OAM and Barbara Thomas through the Thomas Foundation: one in honour of the philanthropy of Rupert Myer AM, former chairman of the National Gallery of Australia Council, and the other in honour of the philanthropy of Tim Fairfax AC, Deputy Chairman of the Council.

The Australian art collection was further augmented by the contributions of many generous supporters, including artists who donated their own work. Major gifts included that of Dale Frank, one of Australia's most significant contemporary painters, who donated an exceptional group of works, including paintings, drawings and

multimedia collages. Valued at around \$4 million, this gift is the most significant made to the Gallery by a living artist since the Arthur Boyd Gift in 1975. Margaret Tuckson AM, who sadly passed away in August, donated her late husband Tony Tuckson's White with lines (charcoal) black border 1970-73 in the financial year, while Prudence MacLeod generously supported the acquisition of Tuckson's stunning Pink, white line, yellow edge, red line middle 1970-73. These two magnificent paintings and previous gifts such as the two from James and Jacqui Erskine in 2011 further the Gallery's goal of having the premier Tuckson collection.

Bill Ferris AC and Lea Ferris funded, through the Ferris Family Foundation, the acquisition of two significant additions to the Gallery's contemporary sculpture collection: one by Linda Marrinon and an elegant abstract work by Inge King, one of Australia's most important sculptors. The Melbourne Art Foundation supported the acquisition of Mikala Dwyer's enticing hanging sculpture The weight of shape 2013. New Yorkbased Australian artist Denise Green AM donated a group of her paintings, prints and drawings and Janenne Eaton gave her meticulously constructed contemporary diptych Untitled 2008. Howard Taylor's highly evocative painting Burnt hillside 1991, which the artist painted on a plywood door, was a most generous gift from Jeff Hall and Sharon Grev.

Other significant late nineteenth-century paintings were acquired with the generous assistance of Foundation Board member the Hon Mrs Ashlev Dawson-Damer AM, who funded the acquisition of Godfrey Rivers's historic Sydney cityscape New South Head Road 1889, and Antoinette Albert. who helped purchase John Mather's rare and unusual painting The artist (Louis Abrahams) at his easel 1887.

John Kirby AM and Carolyn Kirby contributed to the acquisition of Roy de Maistre's oil painting Colour sketch—Dangar Island 1918 and Peter J Hack supplied the funding for the acquisition of a pair of charming pencil and watercolour portraits by Thomas Bock from the mid nineteenth century.

The Australian collection of prints, drawings and illustrated books again received some wonderful gifts. The Uniting Church in Australia gave an extremely important folio of seven watercolours by Richard Browne with descriptive text by Samuel Leigh from 1821. We are grateful to Tim Fairfax AC and Gina Fairfax, who funded the acquisition of JJ Hilder's Central Station, Brisbane 1908, the most significant work by Hilder to enter the national collection to date. Dr Wal Ambrose and Janet Ambrose donated an important 1963 abstract painting by Maori artist Ralph Hotere.

Again, many artists and their families generously donated their own work. Helen Brack donated twenty-eight John Brack drawings from the 1940s to 1961, including the preparatory study for Menswear 1953, a major Brack oil painting purchased by the Gallery in 1982. She also gave thirty-eight of her own drawings as the artist Helen Maudsley. Hertha Kluge-Pott, a key figure in the Melbourne printmaking scene, donated an impressive collection of her printed works from 1953 to 2012. Brian Blanchflower gave a group of one hundred of his colourful 'Painting books' from 1979 to 2011 and Keiko Schmeisser donated a large collection of Jörg Schmeisser's prints from 1966 to 2010. Doreen Coburn generously gave ten John Coburn sketchbooks from 1972 to 2003. Artist Mike Parr and printmaker John Loane donated Parr's K-naks (The gift of tongues) 1995–96, a work comprising twenty woodcut panels.

The Gallery's collection of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander art has been strengthened with another extraordinary gift from Visionary Benefactor Ray Wilson OAM of paintings by Freddie Timms, Ningura Napurrula, Nyurapayia Nampitjinpa, Tjunkiya Napaltjarri and George Tjampu Tjapaltjarri. Ellen Waugh gave a bark painting by Central Arnhem Land artist Aileena Lamanga and Ruth and Steve Lambert provided generous assistance through the De Lambert Largesse Foundation for the acquisition of Wamud Namok's dynamic bark painting Mimih spirits dancing 1981.

Geoffrey White OAM and Sally White OAM continued their generous support of the Asian collection by funding the acquisition of a twelfth-century standing Buddha, a rare bronze from Sri Lanka. Gallery Director Ron Radford AM gave a magnificent twentieth-century Indonesian textile, and Indonesian artist Ketut Nongos's modern sculpture Charm against witches, ghosts, thieves and other evil (tumbal) c 1970 was a gift from Robyn, John and Simeran Maxwell. We are extremely grateful for the ongoing support provided by Andrew and Hiroko Gwinnett to the Gallery's Asian art collection.

Foundation Board member Susan Armitage's further generous support of the Gallery's contemporary South Australian collection funded the acquisition of the intriguing Trent Parke photograph No 001 Candid portrait of two men on a street corner. Adelaide, 2013 2013. International photography was once again enhanced with American benefactor David Knaus's gift of a group of thirty-eight works from the 1880s to 1940s; by various artists these photographs provide a microcosm of the rich heritage and character of the Asia-Pacific region.

Two major pieces of international sculpture were acquired for the collection: Joan Miró's bronze sculpture Head and bird (Tête et oiseau) 1981 was purchased through the Tony Gilbert AM Bequest Fund and two of the Gallery's most generous supporters Kenneth E Tyler AO and Marabeth Cohen-Tyler donated Duccio variations no 7 2000, a major work by British sculptor Anthony Caro, one of the most important figures of modern sculpture. In addition, Penelope Seidler AM generously donated Caro's 1982 paper pulp sculpture #4 Big white, which the artist created at Tyler's print workshop.

Major gifts enhanced the decorative arts and design collection this year. The acquisition, through gift and purchase, of John Houstone's exceptional private collection of nineteenthcentury Australian silver, collected over almost half a century, was of major significance. The late Mari Funaki's private collection of jewellery from 1981 to 2008 was another important gift in expanding the Gallery's representation of contemporary Australian

and international jewellery. The gift from the Ranamok Board of the Ranamok Glass Prize winners over its nineteen-year history was also very generous. The gift from Edward Simpson of Francis Lymburner's sketchbook of 216 drawings and three loose sketches of the Ballets Russes added value to the Gallery's extensive collection of material relating to the ballet company. *Green swamp hills, Tanami mapping III* 2014, a group of eight incised and glazed porcelain objects, was purchased through the Meredith Hinchliffe Fund, and thanks also goes to Johannes Kuhnen for the gift of his *Vessel* 2007.

Another major gift was being finalised at the end of the financial year. Australian businessman, philanthropist and collector Patrick Corrigan AM graciously opened his extensive Australian contemporary photography collection to the Gallery to select works of national importance. Seventy-six contemporary Australian photomedia works by major and emerging artists have been acquired over the years through his generosity, which was the subject of the Gallery's recent photography display *Gifted artists: donations by Patrick Corrigan AM*.

#### Australia exhibition

In September 2013, the exhibition *Australia* opened at the Royal Academy of Arts in London. It was particularly inspiring to see that so many outstanding and important works in the exhibition had been acquired with the support of many generous donors from across Australia, whether that be through large and magnanimous cash donations and gifts of works of art, or the collective impact of campaigns such as the Masterpieces for the Nation Fund and Members Acquisition Fund.

We are very grateful to our twenty-one Honorary Exhibition Circle Patrons, whose generous patronage enabled this extraordinary art event to take place. It was a privilege to be able to celebrate this collective achievement with them in London. The Honorary Exhibition Circle Patrons who came together to raise \$2.1 million in support of the exhibition are: Philip Bacon AM; Anthony

We were also delighted to be joined in London by Gallery and Foundation members, whose enthusiastic participation in the events of the week helped to make this a most memorable experience and the trip of a lifetime.

#### 100 Works for 100 Years

Celebrating the centenary of our national capital, this major campaign to acquire a hundred significant works of art for the national art collection has recently concluded. The total raised through cash donations, fund donations, bequests and gifts of works of art came to over \$21 million. With such extraordinary generosity and support for this campaign, limiting it to only a hundred works proved somewhat difficult, resulting in 115 works of art of outstanding quality being acquired. These truly remarkable works will be a lasting tribute to the nation's capital.

Major supporters such as Tim Fairfax AC and Gina Fairfax, Roslyn Packer AO, Dale Frank, Ray Wilson OAM, James and Jacqui Erskine, John Houstone, Rupert Myer AM and Annabel Myer, Sally White OAM and Geoffrey White OAM, the Thomas Foundation, Dr David Pfanner and Dr Ruth Pfanner, Dr Wal and Janet Ambrose, Philip Bacon AM, Bill Ferris AC and Lea Ferris, Prudence MacLeod, Ray and Diana Kidd, the late Margaret Tuckson AM and Henry Dalrymple among others have so generously given in support of this ambitious campaign.

#### Chairman's report

The National Gallery of Foundation published a commemorative book for the 100 Works for 100 Years campaign.

#### **Bequests and the National Gallery of Australia Bequest Circle**

The National Gallery of Australia Bequest Circle provides a unique opportunity for those supporters who have notified the Gallery of their bequest to be formally recognised and to engage in Gallery activities during their lifetime.

Bequests have had a major impact on the development of the national art collection over the past thirty years. This year, bequest funds have enabled the Gallery to acquire significant works of art for the national collection. A major international sculpture has been purchased through the Tony Gilbert AM Bequest Fund. Joan Miró's bronze sculpture Head and bird (Tete et oiseau) 1981 can be added to last year's Degas sculpture purchased through Tony Gilbert's most generous bequest.

Maori artist John Pule's fascinating and bold black-and-white painting What I will see there 2012 was purchased through the Jane Flecknoe Bequest Fund. This painting by Pule further strengthens the Gallery's collection of New Zealand contemporary art.

An important collection of furniture designed and owned by Walter Burley Griffin and his wife Marion Mahony Griffin was acquired with the support of the William Gladstones Bequest Fund. This includes the desk on which Griffin designed some of his plans for Canberra.

Grace Cossington Smith's spiritual painting I looked, and behold a door was opened in Heaven 1952–53 and Frank Hinder's Commuters (subway people) 1938 were both acquired for the national collection through the Marie and Vida Breckenridge Bequest Fund.

The Ruth Robertson Bequest Fund has assisted in the acquisition of another major work by an Australian artist. George W Lambert's large oil painting La blanchisseuse c 1901 was on loan for the Gallery's retrospective on the artist in 2007

and was among the last of his works remaining in private hands.

The great generosity of the late Margaret Olley AC continues to be felt as the Margaret Olley Art Trust assisted in the acquisition of Jeffrey Smart's final painting Labyrinth 2011. This important painting features a tiny portrait of author HG Wells navigating an endless concrete maze. The purchase, in honour of Director Dr Ron Radford AM, was also assisted by Philip Bacon AM.

The legacy of Visionary Benefactor the late Orde Poynton AO, CMG, continues to be felt through the Poynton Bequest Fund. This year, a number of works by James Turrell have been purchased and will be seen in the Gallery's summer exhibition James Turrell: a retrospective at the end of 2014. Prints by major South African artist William Kentridge and by British contemporary artists Anish Kapoor and Grayson Perry were also acquired through the fund. Another Kentridge, the impressive Remembering the Treason Trial 2013, comprising sixty-three hand-printed panels, was acquired through the fund with further assistance from Anita and Luca Belgiorno-Nettis AM.

I am pleased to report that thirty-eight generous benefactors have become Bequest Circle members since the program commenced in late 2008. Bequest Circle members who have made a beguest of \$100000 or more are listed on the Gallery's honour boards in the main fover, unless anonymous, and a full list is on page 35.

We were saddened to hear that Beguest Circle member Alan Boxer passed away in late June 2014. He has bequeathed a number of works of art to the Gallery. The bequest includes major works by important Australian artists such as Arthur Boyd AC, OBE, Charles Blackman OBE, Donald Friend, Sidney Nolan OM, AC, John Olsen AO, OBE, John Perceval AO and Albert Tucker AO.

#### **National Gallery of Australia Council Exhibitions Fund**

I thank fellow Council members who donated through the Foundation to the National Gallery of Australia Council Exhibitions Fund.

This unique fund was established by the Gallery's Council in 2006 to support the development and staging of Gallery exhibitions. The National Gallery of Australia Council Exhibitions Fund is an invaluable resource that assists and enables the Gallery to present major exhibitions in need of additional financial support.

During 2013–14, the fund supported the exhibitions Gold and the Incas: lost worlds of Peru and Atua: sacred gods from Polynesia, which is travelling to Saint Louis Art Museum in the United States of America.

#### **Foundation Board Publishing Fund**

The Foundation Board created the Foundation Board Publishing Fund in May 2011 to raise funds in support of specialised print and online publications produced by the National Gallery of Australia.

During the year in review, the fund assisted the Gallery with the publication of Collection highlights as well as the commemorative publication for the 100 Works for 100 Years campaign. I am very grateful to my fellow Foundation Directors for their enthusiastic support of this program.

#### **Fundraising Gala Dinner and** Weekend 2014

The seventh annual Foundation Fundraising Gala Dinner and Weekend took place on Saturday 15 and Sunday 16 March 2014. Guests were treated to a weekend of activities that included a welcome lunch in the Gallery's Sculpture Garden, curator-led and behind-the-scenes tours of the collection and Gold and the Incas: lost worlds of Peru, a gala dinner in the magnificent Gandel Hall, named in perpetuity after Visionary Benefactors Pauline Gandel and John Gandel AO, and lunch at the Peruvian Ambassador's residence.

Lextend warm thanks to the Peruvian Ambassador. His Excellency Mr Luis Quesada Inchaustequi and his staff for their support of Gold and the Incas and for their gracious hospitality, which marked the perfect end to a very fine weekend. I would also like to express thanks to Alexandra Burt and Voyager Estate for their support of the weekend.

This year, the Foundation raised \$165500 through the generous support of guests and absent donors. These funds assisted with the acquisition of Charles Blackman's engaging and poetic work The room (The blue dress) 1954.

#### Masterpieces for the Nation Fund 2014

The focus of this year's Masterpieces for the Nation Fund was for the acquisition of Benjamin Duterrau's An infant of Van Diemen's Land 1840, a portrait of a small rosy-cheeked child.

This important early Tasmanian colonial portrait, until now in the possession of the artist's family, has undergone conservation treatment to remove over 170 years of accumulated grime. It now hangs resplendent in its colonial frame made from rare Huon pine in the Tasmanian colonial galleries.

Over 440 generous donors, including Gallery members and supporters from across Australia, gave to this campaign, which has been the most successful in the fund's history.

#### **Members Acquisition Fund 2013-14**

The fifth annual Members Acquisition Fund commenced in September 2013 and was once again enthusiastically supported by Gallery members. More than 500 donors contributed generously towards the acquisition of Hilda Rix Nicholas's majestic and early oil painting The Three Sisters, Blue Mountains 1921-22.

#### **American Friends of the National Gallery** of Australia, Inc

American Friends of the National Gallery of Australia, Inc is an independent charitable organisation established in the United States of America. Periodically, the Friends organisation has made donations in support of events, activities and acquisitions. It has also loaned works of art to the National Gallery of Australia and provided other support. The Friends has recently enjoyed the generous support of donors such as Kenneth Tyler AO and Marabeth Cohen-Tyler, Elaine Wolfensohn and Jim Wolfensohn KBE, AO, through the Wolfensohn Family Foundation and David Knaus.

#### Chairman's report

#### **Foundations and grants**

The Gordon Darling Foundation gave \$150000 in support of the exhibition and catalogue for the Gallery's recent major exhibition Atua: sacred gods from Polynesia. The exhibition re-examined the concept of 'gods' or 'idols' as represented in some of the most exceptional Polynesian works of art from thirty museum collections around the world, including the Gallery's.

Atua, which will be on display at Saint Louis Art Museum in the United States of America until 4 January 2015, aimed to increase awareness and engagement with the art of our neighbouring region and to encourage greater understanding among Australian and American audiences. The Gordon Darling Foundation's support of the catalogue for Atua enabled the Gallery to fulfil its mandate to contribute to the scholarship of art history within Australia and internationally. The catalogue will remain a valuable scholarly reference long after the close of the exhibition.

The first of three tranches of funding totalling \$150000 from Swiss foundation Art Mentor Foundation Lucerne was granted in December 2013 and has helped purchase audio-visual equipment for a multimedia lab for developing rich media content for the Gallery's website, a key part of the Digital Art Education and Access Initiative. In particular, a series of vignettes for the Gallery's new NGA Contemporary website were created with the support of the foundation's funding, providing engaging insight into the Gallery's contemporary Australian art collection.

The Australian National University Centre for European Studies will be supporting a three-year series of public programs at the Gallery that focuses on European works of art from the collection. This partnership has come through a grant from the European Union, which aims to highlight aspects of European culture within Australia.

#### **Acknowledgements**

We were saddened this year by the untimely passing of Dr Lee MacCormick Edwards, a Foundation Board Director, longstanding board member of the American Friends of the National Gallery of Australia and major supporter of the Gallery. She was a vibrant figure in the life of the National Gallery of Australia Foundation, and we will miss her wisdom and enthusiasm.

In 2013. Dr Edwards announced a beguest to the Gallery of nine works of art by major Australian and American artists. These works will be a permanent reminder of Lee MacCormick Edwards's generosity and will carry her name in perpetuity.

I would like to acknowledge and thank the Gallery's retiring Director, Dr Ron Radford AM, for the remarkable vision and leadership he has shown since commencing in 2004. Over the past ten years, Ron has been instrumental to the development and success of the Foundation. He has championed new initiatives such as our 100 Works for 100 Years campaign that celebrated the centenary of Canberra, home to the National Gallery of Australia.

The Foundation is honoured that His Excellency the Hon Sir Peter Cosgrove AK, MC (Retd), Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia, has agreed to act in the role of Patron of the Foundation. I would also like to thank our former patron the Hon Dame Quentin Bryce AD, CVO, for the generous and enthusiastic support she provided to the Gallery and Foundation during her term as Governor-General.

On behalf of the Foundation Board, I thank all of our donors for their generous support, including many donors who have been particularly loyal supporters through their donations to the Foundation over many years.

I very much look forward to the coming year and to working together to further the objectives of the Foundation in support of the National Gallery of Australia.

Finally, I would like to express my gratitude to my fellow Foundation Board Directors for their enthusiastic support, advice and dedicated service. In particular, I would like to mention the generosity extended by Robyn and Graham Burke and Philip Bacon AM, who hosted events in support of the National Gallery of Australia Foundation.

- promote, maintain, improve and develop the National Gallery of Australia
- support the development and conduct by the National Gallery of Australia of travelling exhibitions of works of art.

The Foundation's short-term and long-term objective is to continue to raise funds and seek gifts of works of art to support the above activities, strategically, via fundraising campaigns, actively engaging present and future donors and connecting with the wider community in seeking support for the visual arts.

There was no change in the nature of the Foundation's activities during the year.

#### NATIONAL GALLERY OF AUSTRALIA FOUNDATION DIRECTORS' REPORT

For the year ended 30 June 2014

#### **Operating results**

The Foundation recorded a surplus of \$2,893,286 in 2013-14 (2012-13: \$2,587,122) before it made donations to the National Gallery of Australia. The donations consisted of funds used by the National Gallery of Australia to develop the national collection of works of art and to support the National Gallery of Australia and its travelling exhibitions program. The activities of the Foundation for the 2013-14 year resulted in an operating deficit of \$1,131,172 (2012–13: deficit of \$335,883) after donations of \$4,025,158 (2012–13: \$2,948,329) were made to the National Gallery of Australia.

#### Dividends

The Foundation is precluded by its Memorandum of Association from paying a dividend to its members.

#### Significant changes in the state of affairs

There was no significant change in the state of affairs of the Foundation during the year.

#### Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

At the date of this report, no matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2014 that has significantly affected or may significantly affect either:

- i. the operations of the Foundation
- ii. the results of those operations
- iii. the state of affairs of the Foundation.

#### Likely developments

There are no developments that are likely to significantly affect the operations of the Foundation in financial years subsequent to 30 June 2014.

#### **Benefits**

No indemnities have been given or insurance premiums paid during or since the end of the financial year for any person who is or has been an officer or auditor of the Foundation.

#### Company limited by guarantee

The National Gallery of Australia Foundation is a company incorporated under the the Corporations Act 2001 as a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital.

Each member of the Foundation undertakes to contribute to the property of the Foundation in the event of it being wound up while he or she is a member or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member up to the value of \$100. This payment will contribute to meeting the debts and liabilities of the Foundation as well as winding up expenses. At 30 June 2014, the total amount that members of the company are liable to contribute if the company was wound up is \$7900 (2013: \$7900).

#### **Proceedings**

No person has applied for leave of the Court to bring proceedings on behalf of the Foundation or intervene in any proceedings to which the Foundation is a party for the purpose of taking responsibility on behalf of the Foundation for all or any part of those proceedings.

The Foundation was not a party to any such proceedings during the year.

#### **NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

For the year ended 30 June 2014

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The National Gallery of Australia Foundation (the Foundation) is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. It is a not-for-profit entity, and the significant policies applied in the preparation of the financial statements are:

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations) and the Corporations Act 2001.

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Corporations Act 2001 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of the previous period unless stated otherwise.

Comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation in these financial statements where required.

#### (b) Revenue recognition

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues. Donations and resources received free of charge are recorded as income at the date

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

#### (c) Financial instruments

#### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted). Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except where the instrument is classified at fair value through profit or loss, in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately.

#### Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at either fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest rate method or cost. Fair value represents the amount for which an asset could be exchanged or a liability settled, between knowledgeable, willing parties. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

#### Amortised cost

Amortised cost is calculated as:

- i. the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition
- ii less principal repayments
- iii. plus or minus the cumulative amortisation of the difference, if any, between the amount initially recognised and the maturity amount calculated using the effective interest method
- iv. less any reduction for impairment.

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life or, when this cannot be reliably predicted, the contractual term of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying value with a consequential recognition of an income or expense in profit or loss.

#### Fair value

Fair value is determined based on current market values.

#### Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether an impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss. Also, any cumulative decline in fair value previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified to profit or loss at this point.

#### Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expires or the asset is transferred to another party, whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are either discharged, cancelled or expired. The difference between the carrying value of the financial liability, which is extinguished or transferred to another party, and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

#### (d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes notes and coins held and any deposits in bank accounts with an original maturity of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of changes in value. Cash is recognised at its nominal amount.

#### (e) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the Balance Sheet.

Cash flows are presented in the Cashflow Statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of any investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

#### Receivables (f)

Receivables include accrued interest income on term deposits in which accrued interest represents interest income to be received and prepayments in which goods and services have been paid in advance of receiving them.

#### (g) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within thirty days of recognition of the liability.

#### Impairment of financial instruments

Financial assets are assessed for impairment at each balance date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated. For the year ending 30 June 2014, there was no evidence of impairment

#### **New Australian Accounting Standards**

#### Adoption of new Australian Accounting Standard requirements

During the current year, the company adopted all of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations applicable to its operations that became mandatory.

No accounting standard has been adopted earlier than the application date as stated in the standard. The new standards, revised or amended standards or interpretations issued prior to the signing of the statement by the Chairman and Director and applicable to the current reporting period do not have a material financial impact on the Foundation.

#### Future Australian Accounting Standards requirements

Other new standards, revised or amended standards or interpretations that were issued prior to the signing of the statement by the Chairman and Director and applicable to the current reporting period did not have a financial impact and are not expected to have a future financial impact on the Foundation.

#### 2. TAXATION

The Foundation is exempt from income tax by virtue of sections 50–5 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997* but not from the Goods and services tax (GST). Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or part of the item of the expense.

#### 3. NATIONAL GALLERY OF AUSTRALIA

- (a) The Foundation received significant donations in 2013–14 and 2012–13.
- (b) Certain expenditure incurred by the National Gallery of Australia on behalf of the Foundation has been re-charged to the Foundation.

The Foundation has received services from the National Gallery of Australia free of charge, for which a monetary value has been determined at \$609,397 in 2013–14 (2012–13: \$487,900). These services were generally administrative in nature and included employee and superannuation expenses estimated at \$363,433. All employee provisions are reflected in the National Gallery of Australia's financial statements.

(c) The Foundation donated \$4,025,158 in 2013–14 (2012–13: \$2,948,329) to the National Gallery of Australia to develop the national collection of works of art and to support the National Gallery of Australia and its travelling exhibitions program.

The National Gallery of Australia has control over the Foundation as the Foundation's Constitution provides that its Board shall consist of no more than thirty-one persons of whom the Director of the Gallery and the Chair and Deputy Chair of the National Gallery Council are ex-officio directors of the Foundation and the remaining directors of the Foundation, including the Chair, are appointed by the National Gallery of Australia Council. Transactions with the National Gallery of Australia during the period are disclosed in Note 3 to the financial statements.

#### 11. COMPANY LIMITED BY GUARANTEE

The Foundation is a company incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 as a company limited by guarantee and not having share capital.

Each member of the Foundation undertakes to contribute to the property of the Foundation in the event of it being wound up while he or she is a member or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member up to the value of \$100. This payment will contribute to meeting the debts and liabilities of the Foundation as well as winding up expenses.

This is highly unlikely due to internal mechanisms available to the Foundation (eg internal policies and procedures put in place to ensure there are appropriate resources to meet its financial obligations). The only outstanding payables at 30 June 2014 are for audit fees and GST, which are payable within one year. The Foundation has no past experience of default.

#### (f) Market risk

The Foundation holds basic financial instruments that do not expose the Foundation to any market risks. The Foundation is not exposed to currency, interest-rate risk or price risk.

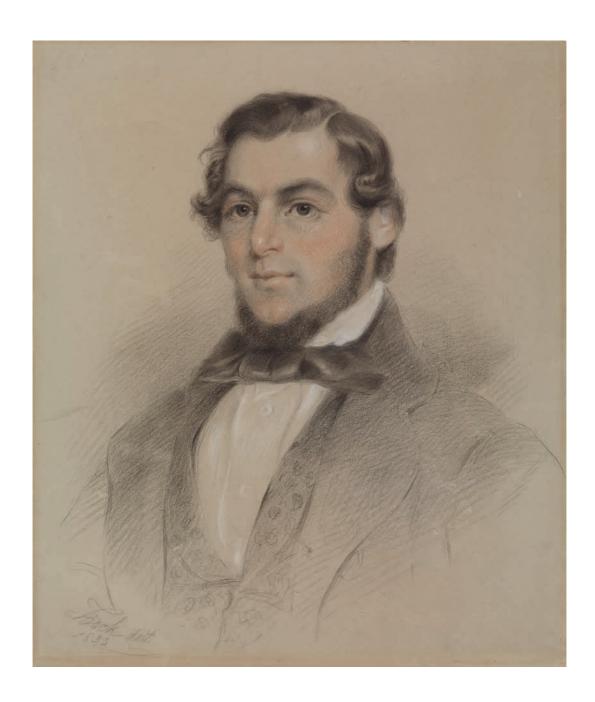

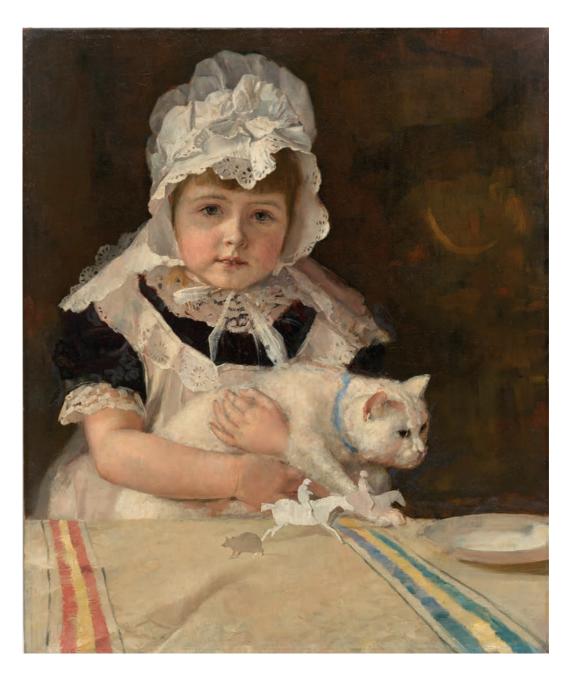

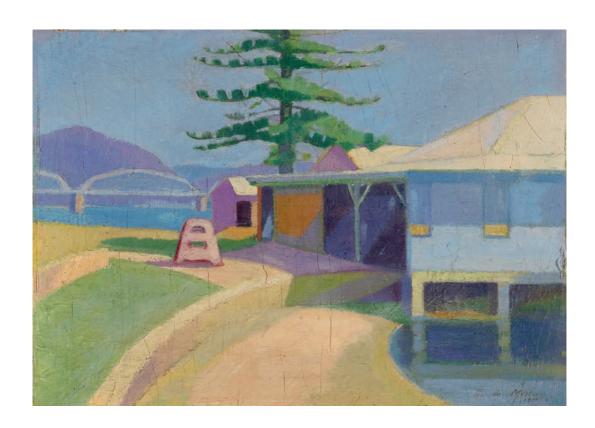

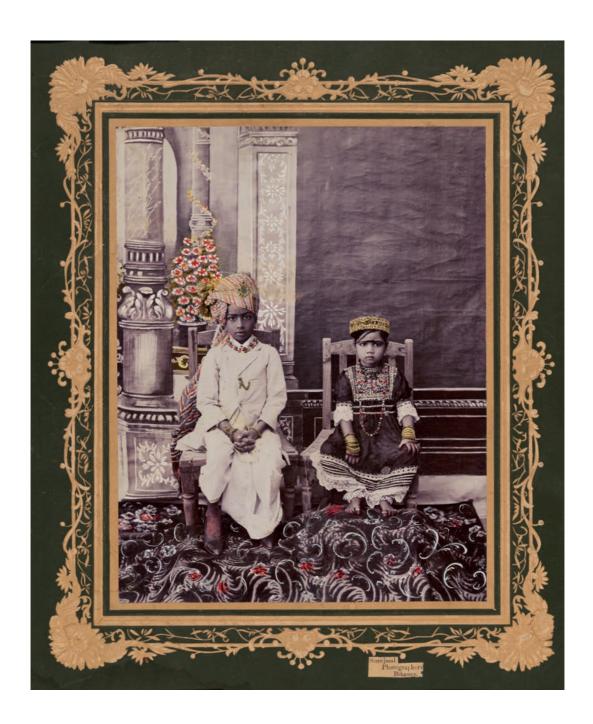
